Virginia has been involved in the theatre and performing since joining a children's drama group at the age of twelve and ending up running it at the age of 25! She is accomplished in all aspects of theatre work having worked backstage and on-stage as well as producing, writing and composing (one of her musicals has been performed as far away as Shaftesbury, Wiltshire!) She tells us she lives on the end of a runway at Gatwick Airport in Sussex and acts and directs for various societies as well as for Imperial Opera.

#### Musical Director-Deborah Johnson

The Sorcerer in 1972 was the occasion of Deborah's first visit to Budleigh Salterton when she appeared in the rôle of Lady Sangazure; so it is fitting that 13 years later she makes her conducting debut in the same opera. In the intervening years she has specialised in the contralto parts of Gilbert and Sullivan and has performed many times in Budleigh Salterton.

Although she started out as a flute teacher, she recently made singing her career when she joined the BBC Singers with whom she broadcasts regularly—including the Last Night of the Proms on television!



#### PRODUCTION NOTES

The Sorcerer was the second collaboration of Gilbert and Sullivan and the first that amounted to a full-length piece. At that stage Gilbert was experienced in the theatre, having written a number of short musical comedies in collaboration with a number of composers; Sullivan's experience of comic opera was limited to Cox and Box and his earlier collaboration with Gilbert, Trial by Jury.

But the new venture came about as a result of Richard D'Oyly Carte who in 1876 decided to form a company, the Comedy Opera Company, which, by the middle of 1877 was ready to produce the next opera by Gilbert and Sullivan.

The question was whether Gilbert and Sullivan were ready for the next G&S opera. Gilbert was still hankering after the 'straight' theatre, and Sullivan's friends were horrified at his success in light opera and did their best to distract him.

Gilbert sent the manuscript of the libretto to Sullivan in April 1877, but Sullivan had not recovered from the death of his brother Frederick (that death inspired Sullivan to write 'The Lost Chord') and he didn't start composing it until August.

The libretto of *The Sorcerer* has its roots in several of Gilbert's earlier works. He wrote a short story for the Graphic entitled 'The Elixir of Love' which closely foreshadows the plot of *The Sorcerer*. He drew also on an early 'Bab Ballad' called 'The Rival Curates'. The carousing over a pot of tea—a dig at the temperence movement—had its precurser in 'The Merry Zingara', Gilbert's burlesque of Balfe's 'The Bohemian Girl'.

Gilbert, Sullivan and Carte were determined that their new company was not going to be made up of the stars already shining on the London stage, and instead they sought suitable material in the provincial theatres, and entertainers performing in town halls and mechanics institutes. Gilbert preferred to teach amateurs or beginning professionals from scratch rather than work with established performers. George Grossmith, who was subsequently to create most of the Gilbert and Sullivan patter parts, was recruited during the casting of Sorcerer. He was reluctant. He felt he was taking a risk as the YMCA would never again engage him as an entertainer after he had been seen on stage—and his reputation as a comic singer to religious communities would be lost once he performed in a theatre!

Having long admired Gilbert's writings, I trust this production is in keeping with his intentions. Admittedly he tended to write 'caricatures' rather than characters, particularly for his leading principals, but I firmly believe that most of the G&S shows make better sense when the characters are believable—and leave you to judge whether they are also more enjoyable!

Sadly, a performance of *The Sorcerer* was the last time Gilbert and Sullivan ever saw each other. It was the 2lst anniversary production at the Savoy Theatre in 1898, and the partnership had, of course, been through a shattering sequence of quarrels, court cases and emnity since The Gondoliers. Sullivan conducted the performance and after the curtain came down the audience called for Gilbert and Sullivan. They entered from different sides of the stage, bowed, did not speak to each other and left the theatre separately. They never saw each other again.

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The cost of putting on a summer show, such as this, is measured, not in hundreds of pounds, but in thousands. A large proportion of this expense is incurred long before we arrive in Devon. Scenery, material, costumes, make-up and music all have to be purchased at the time we first start rehearsing, while year by year our financial restrictions seem to multiply faster than rabbits.

Subscribing members help us because we receive their annual subscriptions at a time when we really need capital. Subscribing members in return obtain preferential booking of seats for the summer show at a price which is fixed the year before, thus circumventing the ravages of inflation. For instance, this year some subscribing members saved 50p on their tickets. Subscribing members can also book early for their friends.

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
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
