




## Utopia Limited The Englishman at home and abroad

Gilbert and Sullivan's penultimate opera was written in 1893 after a four year silence provoked by the famous "carpet quarrel". Like most of their previous works it drew a mixed response from the press and reportedly upset some notable public groups. It ran for only 245 performances and then fell into relative obscurity. Whatever its weaknesses it holds a strong affection in the hearts of those who have subsequently tackled it as witnessed by the enthusiasm for the society's third production of the piece in under twenty years.

Its greatest strength seems to me to lie in the brightness of its satire and the portrayal of the Englishman abroad; a satire which could only have been written by an Englishman safely at home! The spread of the British Empire and its effect on those colonial countries is as clear to us today as it was to W. S. Gilbert in 1893. Examples of foreign potentates embracing western culture continues today and the effects of capitalism on third world nations is often dangerously close to Gilbert's Victorian vision.

This production draw strongly on the habits and customs adopted in the heyday of the British Raj - habits which no doubt would have been brought to Utopia if we British had managed to discover such an island paradise. Therefore prepare to enter a world where formal waistcoats were abandoned in favour of cummerbunds once the equator was crossed and all corsetry had to be guaranteed rust proof.
