The Cast

David Watters (EmCee). Following roles such as Tulsa Gypsy, Perchik Fiddler on the Roof and appearances in several Kurt Weill musicals, the lastest at the Barbican, David has finally managed to avoid being cast as 'the boy next door'. He is a fugitive from Trinity College of Music, where he has organised a production of Guys and Dolls, playing Sky Masterson.

Marlain Angelides (Sally Bowles) has appeared in countless shows since arriving from Cyprus, including Pirates of Penzance, Murder in the Cathedral and Chicago (having played both Velma and Roxie). She is currently taking a foundation course in dance as well as studying biochemistry.

Matthew Soane (Clifford Bradshaw). Following numerous parts as comic Englishmen who sing a lot, most recently swashing his buckle as the Pirate King in The Pirates of Penzance,

Matt has taken the next logical step by playing a serious American who says a lot and sings very little.

Susan Foister (Fraulein Schneider) Sue is a raddled old has-been who has had more farewell performances than Frank Sinatra and freely admits that the only reasons she sticks around are the cheap beer and (as costume mistress) the opportunity of groping lots of young men. This year, the size of the costume budget has meant that she has had to cut back quite drastically on the amount of fabric used in the Kit-Kat Girls' costumes. She sincerely hopes that this will not impair your enjoyment of the show.

Thomas Monk (Herr Schultz). Following an absence of four years, during which he has performed in Sondheim's Pacific Overtures, discovered fashion, and cut his first (and last?) CD, Tom returns to the OpSoc stage to find that everyone has got a lot younger!

Stephen Webb (Ernst Ludwig). This is Stephen's first show since Primary School. He was attracted to OpSoc and Cabaret by the musical's humour and wonderful tunes.

Kirsty Bennett (Fraulein Kost), cast as the murderous slut Roxie Hart in last year's Chicago now plays a prostitute with leanings towards the Nazi Party. When not found recovering from these unsavoury parts in an I.C. bar, she is probably in a pub near Trinity College of Music, where she studies singing.

Lin Yi-Ming (Customs Inspector) joined OpSoc whilst at college in 1990 and has spent the intervening years honing his ability to upstage the principals. On this summer's tour he should notch up his One Hundredth performance with the Company. He is also a stalwart member of Imperial Opera.


