

SYNOPSIS •

All the young ladies at Madame Dubonnet's finishing school in Nice are looking forward to the carnival ball that evening, where they will meet up with their French boyfriends (and one rich American!). All, that is, except for Polly Browne, whose father is extremely rich and has forbidden her to associate with possible fortune hunters. In order not to lose face with the other girls, Polly invents a lover in Paris; but just as her pretence is about to be exposed, she meets and instantly falls in love with Tony, a messenger boy, and they arrange to attend the ball together dressed as Pierrot and Pierrette.

But Tony is not all that he seems. In the middle of an idyllic afternoon with Polly he is spotted by an irate middle-aged couple, who demand his arrest. He escapes, but Polly is devastated - was he really just another fortune hunter? How can Pierrette go to the ball without Pierrot?

The girls' maid and confidente, Hortense, plays cupid to the lovers and persuades tham both to attend the Carnival Ball at the Café Pataplon. There, Pierrot and Pierrette are reunited; Tony's dark secret is finally revealed and a surprise announcement is made.

Virginia King (Director) made her first public appearance at the age of 12, playing the ukelele! She has been on-stage, back-stage, writing and composing - and has been associated with OpSoc since directing The Sorcerer in 1985. She now directs and performs mainly with Imperial Opera. She has also played Bobby van Husen's man-mad sister in Divorce me Darling, sequel to 'The Boyfriend'. She loves working with this particular cast and would like to thank them for some memorable rehearsals!!

Guy Middlemiss (Musical Director)
Guy emerges from behind the piano (which he has been playing at OpSoc rehearsals on and off since 1990), and will have a go at arm-waving instead. He has thoroughly enjoyed it and, subject to the committee's approval, wouldn't mind doing some more.

Georgina King (Assistant Director)
George has performed in many OpSoc shows including Kiss me Kate, Pirates of Penzance, Yeomen of the Guard and The Sorcerer where she made her debut at the age of 8! She is overjoyed at having a part for the first time, although feeling like an old hand (or is that an old 'ham'?).

THE CAST

Kirsty Bennett If you saw the OpSoc production of Cabaret last year, you will probably recognise Kirsty's French accent, as it is almost the same as the German one she used as Fraulein Kost! Her other silly accents include an American Roxie Hart in Chicago, and an upper class Dulcie in Divorce me Darling.

Vicky Swerling Vicky is a first year chemist - or, at least, so she tells us. But, as with many first years, she has decided not to devote 100% of her time to work, and joined OpSoc as soon as she got here. Acting is one of her main hobbies, and she is really glad to be in this musical.

Julia Addison is currently in her first year at Imperial studying Biology. She has performed in school plays and recently appeared in *Grease* and *An Inspector Calls*. She is also an Imperial College Choir member. 'The Boyfriend' has been a lot of fun and she really enjoyed herself!

Sarah Moltoni After a promotion from 'techie' to KitKat girl, Sarah has returned to the OpSoc stage as Fay. Away from Imperial, Sarah is

studying Art & Design in the hope of improving her set-designing skills in time for the summer tour!

Julie Partridge Julie (an escapee diva from Trinity College of Music) has a fine career ahead of her playing forlorn waifs - a role she has played in every show she's appeared in! She keeps threatening to leave OpSoc, but usually forgets by the third pint.

Matthew Soane 'Mad Dog' Soane usually plays upper class twits but, here, he will be giving us his other speciality - the 'accent'. This may explain why the supposedly French Marcel appears to have a Welsh accent (which occasionally strays into Hindustani). Matthew is a fine natural comedian, but with a face like his, he has to be! He also likes beer.
