"On Tuesday evening the 12<sup>th</sup> inst., the Rev. F. G. Merchant, pastor of the Tilehouse Street Baptist Church was presented with a purse containing One Hundred Pounds. The subscriptions in aid of the Testimonial were confined to members of the Church and Congregation. The following statement was made in collecting: - 'It being the cordial wish of the members of the Church & Congregation to present the Rev. F. G. Merchant with a substantial proof of their esteem and appreciation of his faithful and efficient ministrations for six years amongst them, they consider the beginning of the present year a seasonable time for carrying out their object'. The presentation took place in the School Room, which had been elaborately decorated for the occasion. There was, first of all, a Tea Meeting, at which some 250 people were present. After tea, the Rev. W. G. Lewis of St. Albans, presided. Mr. H. Foster, the Senior Deacon, then presented Mr. Merchant with a purse containing the sum named above, and took occasion to speak of how deep was the love and esteem felt for Mr. Merchant by his people, and of their sympathy with him in his arduous labours here, and his important work in London in the training of young men for the ministry. During the last twenty years of his  
life, he laboured under many  
infirmities, and suffered from a  
paralytic stroke, so that he was  
obliged to be taken to the Meeting  
House, in a chair.
